In February 2023, we hosted *The Ford's Theatre Legacy Commissions: A First Look*, a free, special series of events that featured public readings for three new theatrical pieces: *Something Moving: A Meditation on Maynard* by Pearl Cleage; *Young and Just* by Dominic Taylor; and *Blackbox* by Rickerby Hinds. These pieces were commissioned through The Ford's Theatre Legacy Commissions, an initiative in which Ford's has forged partnerships with BIPOC (Black, Indigenous and People of Color) playwrights at the forefront of defining the future of the American theatre. The commissions explore underrepresented historical figures and illuminate stories that might not be as well-known in the racial struggle for equality and civil rights.
