WASHINGTON – Ford's Theatre announced three upcoming public programs in February: the 17th annual Lincoln Oratory Festival, the culminating event for local elementary and middle school students after a deep, weeks-long dive into historical oratory work with Ford's Teaching Artists; Written Then, Spoken Now: Freedom Was In Sight!, an elevated book talk with author Dr. Kate Masur, dramaturg Faedra C. Carpenter and educator Candra Flanagan; and Education and Power in Post-Emancipation America, an exploration of the enduring legacies of Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) founded during Reconstruction with professor Leigh Soares and historian Blake Lindsey

Lincoln Oratory Festival

The 17th annual **Lincoln Oratory Festival** honors the enduring power of words with local students performing a selection of speeches on the historic Ford's Theatre stage on February 4-5. Ford's Theatre Teaching Artists worked with local students to expand vocabulary, develop public speaking skills and strengthen confidence while building an understanding of the historical impact Lincoln and others have made as great writers and orators. Ford's Teaching Artists are ChelseaDee Harrison, W. Ellington Felton, Max Johnson, Kirsten Noetzel and Heidi Fortune-Picker.

The **February 4** performance at 10:30 a.m. features students from **Haycock Elementary School** in Falls Church, Virginia, and **DC Prep Edgewood Middle School** and **Ludlow-Taylor Elementary School** in Washington, D.C. Students will perform speeches by Abraham Lincoln, Frederick Douglass, Powhatan, Geraldine Ferraro and Sojourner Truth.

The **February 5** performance at 10:30 a.m. features students from **Fairhill Elementary School** in Fairfax, Virginia, **Kimball Elementary School** in Washington, D.C., **Francis C. Hammond Middle School** in Alexandria, Virginia, and **Lee Montessori PCS** in Washington, D.C. Students will perform speeches by Abraham Lincoln, Powhatan, Mary McLeod Bethune, Geraldine Ferraro and Sojourner Truth.

"Building competencies in formal and informal communication among students is a vital tool to furthering a child's development," said Ford's Theatre Irani Foundation Director of Education Tricia Patrick. "This program involves key elements including learning from the past, collaboration and ensemble building and speech performance so that students build confidence in themselves as individuals as well as a classroom community.

Through this program, over the course of five classroom visits, students gain not only historical perspective but also invaluable insights into the timeless principles of effective communication by applying Ford's Approach to Oratory. This year, the program connected with new first-time participants and welcomed back several return schools, highlighting the importance of speech and communication in the classroom and as a life skill.

The Written Then, Spoken Now program leverages the convergence of history and theatre, bringing to life stories of Black Americans in Washington, D.C., and its surrounding region, who bravely worked to

reunite their families, build their communities, and claim rights long denied them.
