Sister Act

Sister Act is a musical comedy. It follows the story of Deloris Van Cartier, a nightclub singer who witnesses a crime, and hides among nuns in a convent for protection.

The story takes place in the 1970s in the city of Philadelphia, PA.

This musical tells a story with actors talking, dancing and singing on the stage.

Stage

The things on stage (called the set) for *Sister Act* will change many times throughout the show.

I will see a nightclub, a police station, the streets of Philadelphia, an apartment and a Catholic church.

Parts of the set are brightly colored and sparkly.

Music

There is a band sitting in front of the stage who play music throughout the performance. The area is called an orchestra pit, and it is much lower than the stage.

The music can be both loud and soft at times. The actors onstage will sing and dance along with the music.

Sound and Lights

The kind of music Deloris loves to perform is big and bold. At times the show can sound loud.

Parts of the show have lots of bright lights and glitter on the stage.

I can bring headphones, earplugs or visors to the theatre and wear them anytime during the show.

Violence

One of the main characters is a violent criminal. In the story, he kills a man, hurts another man, and threatens Deloris.

The actors are pretending and have practiced these moments many times. No one actually gets hurt.

Several characters use guns onstage. These guns are not real and will not fire any live shots. I will hear loud "bangs" through the speakers in the theatre. These are sound effects and not real gunshots.

Disco



Convent

In the Catholic faith, women can become nuns and live together in a convent. The nuns in *Sister Act* wear a uniform called a habit and live a modest life focused on their faith.

The choir in Sister Act is used to singing traditional hymns.
