Cabinet Conversations: Echoes from the Steps

Civil War Forts Hike

November 8, 10 a.m.-12:30 p.m.

When the Civil War began, Washington, D.C. was surrounded by slave-holding states and Confederate sympathizers. By the summer of 1861, 68 forts were hastily constructed to defend the capital. These remnants remain part of the city today. This two-mile outdoor hike from **Fort DeRussy** to **Fort Stevens** and **Battleground National Cemetery** has become an annual favorite, and we are excited to welcome participants back this year.

From Quill to Curtain: Crafting Plays Inspired by History

January 17, 31 and February 14 | Saturdays, 10 a.m.-12 p.m.

This three-part workshop series invites writers of all levels to explore the craft of playwriting through the lens of historical figures and events. Participants will develop narrative structure, use of primary sources and character development while considering how the past connects to the present. Facilitated by **Howard University Professor of Dramaturgy and Playwriting Denise Hart**, the series culminates with a sharing of excerpts from participants' works.

The Abraham Lincoln Institute (ALI) and Ford's Theatre Society present a free symposium focused on the life, career and legacy of President Abraham Lincoln.

Legacy in the Making: A Day of Advancing the Unfinished Work: Inspired by Lincoln's personal conviction in the ideals outlined in the Declaration of Independence, partners and thought leaders explore the ways in which the legacies of Lincoln and the founding of the United States manifest today. This full day of panel discussions will illuminate the opportunities and responsibilities we are challenged to continue, May 16, 2026.

History Talks is a webinar series designed for history enthusiasts of all ages, featuring compelling visuals with content experts delving into the assassination of President Lincoln and the world of Civil War Washington.

On April 14, 2026, we explore *Inside the Petersen House*. When Abraham Lincoln was shot at Ford's Theatre on April 14, 1865, soldiers carried the unconscious president across the street to the Petersen House, where he died the next morning. The testimonies given by the residents living at the house transport us to that tragic night; meet the ordinary people who witnessed the death of the president.

On May 12, 2026, shine a spotlight on the *Lesser-Known Players* in the story of President Lincoln's assassination. There were over 1000 witnesses in the theatre on April 14, 1865, many of whom left compelling accounts of the historical tragedy and went on to live fascinating lives. Together we'll learn more about some of those who were involved in and witness to the assassination.
