Annual Abraham Lincoln Institute Symposium**

**WASHINGTON, D.C.** – The Ford's Theatre Society and the Abraham Lincoln Institute (ALI) are pleased to announce the **29th Annual Abraham Lincoln Institute Symposium**, taking place **Saturday, March 21, 2026, at Ford's Theatre** in Washington, D.C., co-sponsored by the **Lincoln Group of DC**, which helped originally conceive of the event. This full-day event brings together distinguished scholars and public figures for discussions on President Abraham Lincoln's life, leadership and enduring impact on American civic life—especially in connection with the 250th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence.

Under the theme “Abraham Lincoln, the Declaration of Independence, and the State of Civic Life Today,” the 2026 symposium will feature a dynamic program of panel conversations that explore Lincoln's historical legacy, the origins of the Civil War, democratic principles and how Lincoln's ideas continue to resonate in contemporary civic discourse.

“Each year, the Abraham Lincoln Institute Symposium offers audiences the chance to hear directly from leading historians and engage with current scholarship on Abraham Lincoln,” said **Paul R. Tetreault**, director of Ford's Theatre. “By bringing these conversations to Ford's Theatre, the program helps place Lincoln's leadership in historical context while inviting the public to consider its relevance to civic life today.”

This free, full-day event is open to the public. Advance tickets are encouraged and available now, with seating offered on a first-come, first-served basis on the day of the event.

### Symposium Panels and Featured Conversations

The symposium will feature four main panel discussions, including:

- ***Paths to the Civil War*** — A conversation between Pulitzer Prize-winning author **Edda Fields-Black** (Carnegie Mellon University), author of *COMBEE: Harriet Tubman, the Combahee River Raid, and Black Freedom during the Civil War*, and **Richard Carwardine** (Oxford University), author of *Righteous Strife: How Warring Religious Nationalists Forged Lincoln's Union*, moderated by **Steve Inskeep** of NPR.
- ***Lincoln and the Declaration's Promise of Equality*** — A dialogue with **Akhil Amar** (Yale Law School), author of *Born Equal: Remaking America's Constitution, 1840-1920* (ALI's 2026 book prize winner), and **Lucas Morel** (Washington and Lee University), author of *Lincoln and the American Founding* and *Measuring the Man: The Writings of Frederick Douglass and Abraham Lincoln*, moderated by **Jeff Rosen**, CEO Emeritus of the National Constitution Center and Professor of Law at The George Washington University Law School.
- ***Lincoln and Democracy in the Past, Present, and Future*** — A panel with Pulitzer Prize-winning historian **Annette Gordon-Reed**, author of *The Hemingses of Monticello*, and biographer **Richard Brookhiser**, author of *Founder's Son: A Life of Abraham Lincoln*, moderated by journalist **Judy Woodruff**.
- ***Lincoln, the Declaration, and Civic Life Today*** — A concluding session featuring **David Rubenstein** in discussion with the symposium's invited speakers on Lincoln's place in American civic life. Rubenstein is CEO of the Carlyle Group and author of *Abraham Lincoln: His Life in Print*.

The symposium will also feature live music by American folk musicians Jay Ungar and Molly Mason, who will be performing their hit "Ashokan Farewell."

Reserve your tickets now on the Ford's Theatre website. In addition to the speakers, we will hold book signings and opportunities for patrons to explore Lincoln's history with our esteemed guests. Each discussion will conclude with audience questions. Authors will sign books in the Ford's Theatre lobby.
